It is, however, not just my tribe, but others as well (Baptist, Methodist, Presbyterian, Bible Churches, and more).

As someone who does ministry through Hope Network I can attest to the truth that my friend and HOPE Network partner Carlus Gupton has said that it could take up to two years to find a preacher whether your a small or large congregation. Matt Dabbs asked me to post a response to Carlus' post.

The first three quarters of this year, Hope Network has done ministry with 250+ churches and with 400+ church leaders. It is time that the church raises up its own ministers in collaboration with creative theological education.

I am not discouraged, rather the time requires us to adapt for the church to be the church, not dependent on professional ministers per se'. Why do you think there is a minister shortage in Churches of Christ?

More on this later. In the meantime, remember, let us be who claim to be—a priesthood of believers (1 Peter 2.9).





The Tradition of Advent

We are now in the Advent Season. In our Restoration heritage of the Church of Christ (to go back to the Bible for the authority of our church practices, which is sometimes summarized in the theme, "speak where the Bible speaks and be silent where the Bible is silent") we have put little emphasis, or none, on Advent traditions. In fact, in many congregations, it will never be mentioned, and some would even teach that it is wrong or sinful to do so since it is never mentioned in the Bible as a practice of the early church. But most Christian denominations honor the tradition of Advent in some form or another. So, it wouldn't hurt for us to know a little more about its meaning and intent.

The word Advent is taken from the Latin word *adventus,* which is used for the Greek word *parousia* in the New Testament for the "coming" of Christ, both His first and second. Advent is a season of looking back to the coming of Christ at his birth and looking forward to His return. It lasts four Sundays leading up to Christmas. This year, Advent begins Sunday, Nov. 27, and ends on Saturday, Dec. 24th. The history of Advent dates as far back as 480 and has been observed in a variety of ways, but here are some general practices.

The observance of Advent has generally had a mix of emotions and practices, running from great joy over Jesus' birth, our salvation, the hope of the resurrection, and Jesus' return to take us with Him to our eternal home with God; to the serious introspection and soul searching in connection with preparation for the Lord's Return and Judgement. This includes joyful worship and celebration of praise, prayerfulness, and even fasting. The Sundays have traditionally dealt with Bible readings, prayers, and songs focused on major themes dealing with both the birth and return of Christ. Many church worship services and home observances include the lighting of candles. The candles are often part of an Advent wreath. The evergreen branches of the wreath represent eternal life made possible by Jesus' first and second coming. There are traditionally four candles. A new candle is lit on each Sunday leading up to Christmas. The colors vary according to church traditions, but the candles most commonly represent hope, faith, joy (peace) and love. The four candles are often the same color, white, blue, or purple. Often there will be a fifth candle placed in the middle, which may be larger, and is most often white to represent Christ, and it is lighted on Christmas Day.

There is no command to observe Advent traditions, but for some, these traditions, in some form or another, have helped them focus on the spiritual during this season, rather than the commercialization and stress.
